2019 Show Scoop

A midweek Daffodil Show is to be held April 11-12, with set up the day before, on Wednesday April 10, at 1:00 pm. Staging runs through the night until 7:00am the following morning. The Orthwein Floral Display Hall is down the hall from where we have had past shows, and we will be in the same rooms for staging and friend chicken, the same parking arrangements, and same door as usual. Getting Flowers Ready for the Show

Members are advised to watch the weather forecast and pick blooms ahead of time in the event of rain, hail or damaging winds, plus hot burning sunlight. In the week preceding our show.

Have you ever groomed a flower while it's still growing in the garden? It's much easier to clock and smooth the petals while it's growing and not already hardened off.

Don't cut your stems—pick them! If they stretch instead of snapping off, it's the wrong time of day. Against information to the contrary for most flowers, early afternoons or later seems better than mornings for daffodils. Use warm water in the vase, please!

“Royal Daffodils” Design

A whole new world will be unveiled when the floral design portion of the ‘Royal Daffodils’ show transports us to a Scottish Castle, The Royal Ascot, The Sahara Desert and Xi'an, the city of ancient Chinese Dynasties at the 2019 GSLDS Daffodil Show.



The Road Not Taken

THE ROAD NOT TAKEN IS LINED WITH DAFFODILS

"Two roads diverged in a yellow wood,

And sorry I was I could not travel both...

...and I - I took the one less travelled by,

And that has made all the difference."

This famous poem by Robert Frost seems to talk of Autumn leaves in the woods of New England. He is world famous for his poems of rough stone walls and being a "swinger of birches" so this poem would also seem to be set in an American wood in autumn.

In fact, the setting is in the wild daffodil fields of western Gloucestershire, England where he had friendships with several English poets.

The "yellow wood" referred to the many small *Narcissus pseudonarcissus* growing wild in hedgerows and along wooded paths. Frost had a friend, Edward Thomas, who could not decide whether to go to America with the Frost family or enlist in the Army since war had been declared (WWI). Frost wrote the poem for him saying that "whichever road he took he would be sorry he didn't go the other". Thomas enlisted in the Artists Rifles Regiment within days of reading the poem.

The daffodils are still blooming in Dymock, Gloucestershire, in protected areas of undisturbed damp woodland with many less travelled paths from which to choose.

Two roads diverged in a yellow wood,
And sorry I could not travel both
And be one traveler, long I stood
And looked down one as far as I could
To where it bent in the undergrowth;

Then took the other, as just as fair,
And having perhaps the better claim,
Because it was grassy and wanted wear;
Though as for that the passing there
Had worn them really about the same,

And both that morning equally lay
In leaves no step had trodden black.
Oh, I kept the first for another day!
Yet knowing how way leads on to way,
I doubted if I should ever come back.

I shall be telling this with a sigh
Somewhere ages and ages hence:
Two roads diverged in a wood, and I—
I took the one less traveled by,
And that has made all the difference.

McAdams Daffodil Open House, Apitherapy, & Hot Dog Roast

The timing should be perfect, not only for daffodils, but for woodland wildflowers, too. The energetic among us can walk the 5 miles of trails he has there and see the birds and the tree house. In addition to all that, there are bees, chickens, guineas, cats, a 50 ft. cable bridge, plus 100,000 daffodil blooms... but maybe not all blooming on the very day.

Consider Annuals




The [NOAA Climate Prediction Center](#) is forecasting a hot, wet summer for most of Missouri. This is bad for susceptible cultivars which may rot unless they are shaded. Some of our members use a “green mulch” (weeds) but members growing in a garden setting may wish to shade their bulbs this year with annuals. Vines such as pumpkin, cantaloupe, watermelon and trailing nasturtium give a lot of bang for the buck and cover a lot of ground. In addition to shade, they will drink up excess rainfall and provide color and edible fruits & flowers. Seed is available now from any garden center or hardware store.
